SB 411 Updates:

In the event of a disruption that prevents the eligible legislative body from broadcasting the meeting to members of the public using the call-in option or internet-based service option, or in the event of a disruption within the eligible legislative body's control that prevents members of the public from offering public comments using the call-in option or internet-based service option, the eligible legislative body shall take no further action on items appearing on the meeting agenda until public access to the meeting via the call-in option or internet-based service option is restored. Actions taken on agenda items during a disruption that prevents the eligible legislative body from broadcasting the meeting may be challenged pursuant to Section 54960.1.

- (C) The eligible legislative body shall not require public comments to be submitted in advance of the meeting and shall provide an opportunity for the public to address the legislative body and offer comments in real time.
- (D) Notwithstanding Section 54953.3, an individual desiring to provide public comment through the use of an internet website, or other online platform, not under the control of the eligible legislative body, that requires registration to log in to a teleconference may be required to register as required by the third-party internet website or online platform to participate.
- (E) (i) An eligible legislative body that provides a timed public comment period for each agenda item shall not close the public comment period for the agenda item, or the opportunity to register, pursuant to subparagraph (D), to provide public comment until that timed public comment period has elapsed.
- (ii) An eligible legislative body that does not provide a timed public comment period, but takes public comment separately on each agenda item, shall allow a reasonable amount of time per agenda item to allow public members the opportunity to provide public comment, including time for members of the public to register pursuant to subparagraph (D), or otherwise be recognized for the purpose of providing public comment
- (iii) An eligible legislative body that provides a timed general public comment period that does not correspond to a specific agenda item shall not close the public comment period or the opportunity to register, pursuant to subparagraph (D), until the timed general public comment period has elapsed.

i. Topic Description: Hamburger House/AVIVA NPG

This grant aims to enhance safety measures at the Wallis House by installing security cameras at the Home and providing security orientations for residents. Wallis House is the only housing program in Hollywood designed to support women and their children transitioning out of homelessness into independent living. Each year, it serves over 200 individuals facing homelessness, domestic violence, and other crises. The requested funding will improve the quality of life and provide peace of mind for clients, staff, and the surrounding community.

Located on a busy street in Hollywood, Wallis House encounters unique security challenges due to high tourism levels. Installing security cameras will deter potential criminal activity and foster a sense of safety among residents and neighbors. By educating residents on reporting suspicious activity and maintaining situational awareness, AFCS aims to cultivate a supportive atmosphere that promotes healing and personal growth for the women living in the program while benefiting the entire community.

Motion: The Hollywood Hills West Neighborhood Council (HHWNC) approves the Neighborhood Purposes Grant (NPG) request from the Hamburger Home dba Aviva Family and Children's Services (AFCS) for \$5,000 to support enhanced safety measures at the Wallis House (1701 Camino Palmero St, located in Area 6), a 36-bed interim Supportive Housing Program for women and their children transitioning out of homelessness into independent living.

The Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority (MRCA) is the only public agency responsible for acquiring, maintaining, and protecting local open spaces and wildlife corridors within the Eastern Santa Monica Mountains. The MRCA has historically relied on temporary, local funding measures to continue its operations, as it does not receive permanent, ongoing funding from local or state taxes. Without the renewal provided by Measure H, the MRCA's ability to protect these critical areas could be severely compromised, threatening both fire prevention efforts and wildlife protection.

For \$65 per year for 15 years only, Measure H will provide the MRCA with the necessary resources to continue local fire prevention and protection services and to safeguard local open space. These funds will help protect diverse wildlife, including mountain lions. bobcats, and deer, all of which rely on these habitats for survival.

100% of the funds generated by Measure H will be used exclusively within the Santa Monica Mountains and Hollywood Hills, from the 405 freeway to Griffith Park. A Citizens' Oversight Committee and annual audits will ensure accountability.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE H

By Dawyn R. Harrison, County Counsel

Approval of Measure H ("Measure") would authorize the Governing Board ("Board") of the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority ("MRCA"), to impose a special tax ("Tax") of \$65 per year, for a period of not more than fifteen years, on all taxable developed real property within the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority Community Facilities District No. 2024-1 ("CFD"), located in the Santa Monica Mountains west of Griffith Park and east of Interstate 405 ("Area"). The MRCA placed the Measure on the ballot by Resolution No. 24-91, "Resolution of the Governing Board of the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority Ordering an Election on a Special Tax, Establishing Specifications of the Election Order, and Requesting Consolidation With Other Elections Occurring on Tuesday, November 5, 2024," adopted by the Board on July 10, 2024.

Proceeds of the Tax will be used for the purposes of maintaining, improving, servicing, protecting, and preserving open space, parkland, wildlife corridors, natural habitats, lands, waters and facilities owned, managed or maintained by the MRCA within the Area; financing the acquisition of additional lands and protection of such lands from development in the Area; park ranger patrols and services; fire prevention and fire protection services; and paying any administrative or incidental expenses related to the aforementioned purposes.

Developed parcels subject to the Tax are real property with improvements for residential, commercial or other purposes. The Tax will not be levied on any undeveloped property or non-taxable property in the Area. A low-income exemption is available in accordance with the Measure. The Tax shall be collected annually through the County of Los Angeles property tax bill in the same manner as the County property taxes are collected, and subject to the same penalties. In the event a property owner within the CFD believes that the portion of the Tax levied on their property is in error, the property owner may file a written appeal by no later than June 30 of the fiscal year in which the levy occurred with the Executive Officer of the MRCA.

Tax proceeds shall be deposited in a separate account in accordance with Government Code section 50075.1. The MRCA will submit an annual report to the Board showing the amount of proceeds collected and expended, and the status of any projects required or authorized to be funded from the Tax in accordance with Government Code section 50075.3. In addition, the Board shall appoint a citizens' oversight committee to review and report annually on the expenditure of the Tax proceeds.

If approved, the Tax will be levied annually beginning in Fiscal Year 2025-26, for a period not to exceed fifteen years. The Tax shall not be increased over time.








2-Stall Restroom Elevation and Floor Plan

4) Please describe the purpose and intent of the grant.

This grant aims to enhance Aviva Family & Children's Services safety measures by installing security cameras at Wallis House, our 36-bed Interim Supportive Housing Program and providing security orientations to its residents. Wallis House is the only housing program in Hollywood designed to support the needs of women and their children transitioning out of homelessness into independent living. Our intent with this request is to enhance our security measures, improve quality of life, and provide peace of mind for our clients, staff, and community members at large. Each year, Wallis House plays a crucial role in ensuring the safety and well-being of more than 200 women and children experiencing homelessness, domestic violence, and other crisis situations. Therefore, it is imperative to create a safe environment for families to heal, our staff to effectively deliver services, and volunteers to continue to give their time.

How will this grant be used to primarily support or serve a public purpose and benefit the public at-large. (Grants cannot be used as rewards or prizes for individuals)

Wallis House is a historic building on one of the busiest streets in Hollywood with high levels of tourism. Security in a busy, touristy neighborhood is crucial to ensure the safety of visitors and residents alike, fostering a welcoming atmosphere that encourages exploration and protects the vibrant local economy. By providing a visible deterrent to potential criminal activity, security cameras can create a more secure environment, fostering a sense of safety among Wallis House residents and community members who may have experienced trauma or instability in the past. By monitoring and recording activities, we can proactively address any security concerns and respond to any incidents that may arise in the neighborhood. Upon arrival, Wallis House residents are educated on the importance of reporting any suspicious activity they observe, situational awareness, and being a good neighbor to foster a positive community atmosphere. We also hold monthly community meetings where safety issues are addressed and discussed with all residents as they arise. Having a secure environment can promote residents' sense of dignity and empowerment, enabling them to focus on their personal growth and healing. Overall, furthering the safety measures at Wallis House will cultivate a supportive atmosphere that benefits both the women living in the program and the surrounding community by promoting safety, accountability, and trust.

Hollywood Hills West Neighborhood Council hereby requests the Mayor of Los Angeles, Karen Bass and the Los Angeles City Council to urgently revise Executive Directive 1 (ED 1) in order to protect our most vulnerable residents, and to consider constraints on existing and Long-term emergency planning efforts. While the Hollywood Hills West Neighborhood Council recognizes the need to address the housing crisis in Los Angeles, it's important to consider equitable access to emergency services, equitable developments that are not affordable at the cost of being hazardous, and fine-tuning negative policy impacts on our low-income, marginalized and long-term residents.

The Board of Hollywood Hills West Neighborhood Council (HHWNC) opposes the ED 1 Ordinance unless amended to include the following amendments and guidelines:

Amendments:

- Define terms of affordability per state mandated use of HUD figures using actual dollar amounts per project when presented, at the time of application or vesting, and include on the Los Angeles City website for public access.
- The following zones and property/parcel conditions should not qualify for ED1
 ministerial approval: substandard street adjacency, high-fire zones, flood-risk
 zones, properties that fall within an Alquist-Priolo Zone, inadequate soil
 conditions, historic structures, and historic overlay zones. Additionally, no ED1

developments should be within 100-feet of any such historic structures or historic overlay zones.

- Require ED 1 projects meet minimum Tier 2 TOC qualification.
- 4. Create a monitoring system to enforce post-development affordability of <u>units</u>, <u>and</u> establish a publicly accessible database of affordable units (i.e. units subject to regulatory agreements that include rental restrictions for any number of years.) Any projects that benefit from ministerial procedure should have resulting affordable units monitored and enforced for maintaining affordability.
- The provisions of (L) will extend to all rent-controlled and/or affordable units subject to rental restrictions.

Projects that don't meet these requirements under ED 1 should go through discretionary approval, under obligations of meeting health and safety standards, maintaining accessible emergency services, and providing equitable standards of housing regardless of affordability. Per AB 686, the duty of Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing "requires all state and local public agencies to facilitate deliberate action to explicitly address, combat, and relieve disparities resulting from past patterns of segregation to foster more inclusive communities," which the Hollywood Hills West Neighborhood Council interprets to include the mitigation of risk-imposing housing.

HHWNC is in support of the above amendments to guide the implementation of ED1.

City officials, City Council and City Planning, and Mayor Karen Bass, should urgently address the <u>aforementioned considerations</u> in an immediate manner due to the streamlined nature of these developments underway, that have immediate effects on our residents.
